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Christ is Alive!

"Christ is alive." This is the great truth which fills our faith with meaning. Jesus, who died on the cross, has risen. He has triumphed over death; he has overcome sorrow, anguish and the power of darkness. "Do not be terrified" was how the angels greeted the women who came to the tomb. "Do not be terrified. You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen; he is not here." "This is the day which the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it."

Easter is a time of joy to be found really and fully in the Christian's heart. For Christ is alive. He is not someone who has gone, someone who existed for a time and then passed on, leaving us a wonderful example and a great memory.

No, Christ is alive. Jesus is the Emmanuel: God with us. His resurrection shows us that God does not abandon his own. He promised he would not and he has kept his promise.

Christ is alive in his Church. "I tell you the truth: it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Counsellor will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you." That was what God planned: Jesus, dying on the cross, gave us the Spirit of truth and life. Christ stays in his Church, its sacraments, its liturgy, its preaching — in all that it does.

Christ is alive in Christians. Our faith teaches us that we, in the state of grace, are filled with God. We are men and women. We are flesh and blood, people with sentiments and passions, with sorrows and joys. For as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will be made to live."

Christ's life is our life, just as he promised his Apostles at the last supper: "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our home with him." That is why a Christian should live as Christ lived, making the affections of Christ his own, so that he can exclaim with St Paul: "It is now no longer I that live, but Christ lives in me!"

The following is a recent text from the Ukrainian mother to Penny:

Dear Penny, thank you for your thoughts about us. Physically, we are fine: I work, Ygor has school and football, Artem has second year of university remotely (there are no bomb shelters).

We are tired - every night the shaheeds fly - we either hide or, having no strength left, we ignore them. And it is also scary because it is not clear how this will end. But we live while we are alive!!!

Please continue to pray for this family and for God's peace and justice to touch the lives of all involved.
